The Need for this Training

- Indiana has a high incidence of alcohol, tobacco and other drug use by pregnant women. It is estimated that:
 - 20% use tobacco - 7th highest rate in the country, affecting nearly 18,000 babies per year
 - 10% use alcohol, affecting nearly 9,000 babies per year
 - 5% use drugs, affecting nearly 4,500 babies per year
- Recent research in the U.S. and Canada indicates that only 5% to 10% of pregnant women are identified and receive appropriate treatment for their substance use disorder.
- The 2007 White House Office of National Drug Control Policy estimates that savings from verbal screening and brief interventions are \$2.50 for every \$1 spent. The estimated lifetime costs of caring for a baby exposed to alcohol, tobacco and other drugs range from \$750,000 to \$1.4 million.
- IPN has found no product like this on the market – one that focuses exclusively on pregnant women and addresses all three substances – tobacco, alcohol and other drugs.

- Use the 2 item and 4 P's plus screening tools within the initial prenatal visit.
- Use 5A's screening and intervention tool with women using tobacco during pregnancy.
- Use TACE screening and intervention tool with women using alcohol during pregnancy.
- Use a brief FRAMES intervention.
